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SUMMARY & BACKGROUND

On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund. The ARP Act requires that a minimum of \$8.09 billion (90 percent) be allocated to LEAs, including charter schools and Special Act School Districts that are LEAs. Pursuant to the terms of the ARP Act, LEA allocations have been calculated using the relative shares of grants awarded under Title I, Part A of the ESEA for the most recent federal fiscal year (2020). Each eligible LEA's ARP-ESSER allocation may be found HERE.

Under section 2001(d)(2) of ARP Act of 2021, each State Educational Agency (SEA) must make ARP-ESSER allocations to LEAs in an expedited and timely manner and, to the extent practicable, not later than 60 days after the SEA receives its ARP-ESSER funds. The first portion of ARP-ESSER Funds was awarded to states on March 24, 2021, and 60 days from that day is May 24, 2021. The U.S. Department of Education (USDE) has taken the position that an SEA makes allocations when it authorizes the LEA to begin to obligate funds in accordance with its needs. To enable New York State's LEAs to begin to obligate ARP-ESSER funds by USDE's May 24, 2021 deadline, the application for LEA 90% base ARP-ESSER allocations is being administered by NYSED as a two-part application process:

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 1: The first step was for each LEA to submit signed assurances to NYSED by May 24, 2021. Upon receipt of signed LEA assurances, NYSED provided an email notice to the LEA of substantially approvable application status. Upon receipt of such notice, LEAs were able to begin obligating their allocation of 90% base ARP-ESSER funds.

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 2: The second step will be the submission of a full application and budget by the LEA. NYSED will issue a Grant Award Notice (GAN) to the LEA after the LEA's application is fully reviewed and approved by NYSED. Part 2 will address several of the plan-related assurances an LEA must provide in Part 1 of the application process.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to reserve at least 20% of their 90% ARP-ESSER allocation to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year programs, and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social, and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of the coronavirus on economically disadvantaged students, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care. The district used several avenues in order to engage a diverse and representative set of stakeholders while developing our plan. The district started with sending a survey out to the entire school community and posted it on our website at the start of the development. We received well over 1,000 responses. The guidelines about ARP and responses from the survey were presented to the school board, recorded and placed on the website. Next step was each school building held stakeholder meetings to gather input and suggestions and reported back to the district. Once all the input from the survey, board meeting, and school meetings was gathered, a team started to create the plan. The information has been reported back to stakeholders as we continued to tweak the spending plan.

In the space provided below, please describe the extent to which and how the funds will be used to implement prevention and mitigation strategies that are, to the greatest extent practicable, consistent with the most recent CDC guidance on reopening schools, in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning.

The district is going to operate fully in person 5 days a week. We have used ESSER 1 funding for all necessary PPE needed and sanitation supplies. Our school reopening plans include social distancing and masking, as per the CDC guidelines and our county health department. We do not need to use ARP funding for any masks or social distancing. The funds from ESSER 1 was used to purchase anything needed for this school year.

4. In the space provided below, please describe the data that the LEA will use to identify student needs and monitor student progress as a result of planned interventions and supports.

The district will continue to gather ELA and Math benchmarking data to monitor academic needs. In summer school, IReady was being piloted and STAR and DIBELS will be used for the 2021-2022 school year. Students will be progressed monitored throughout the year and data will be analyzed at all school data meetings. The district is using ESSER 2 funding to acquire a platform for recording student data. This is needed to create reading data reports. Student attendance will be examined weekly with the support of the Family Engagement Liaison for both the elementary and secondary level. The schools will also be monitoring rates of referral, we recognize behaviors are sometimes the result of frustration related to academics or an outreach from a student for more emotional support.

Students were identified to attend summer school this year from DIBELS, STAR, and attendance data for K-8. Summer school support will include ELA, Math and SEL lessons. The district will continue to identify students that are struggling in these areas and invite them to attend summer school for 3 years. High school students were identified by lack of course credit and assigned to attend a 6 week summer school course. ENL teachers are included in the programing, as well as special education teachers. Both will be planning with the teachers to support both sub groups. Teaching assistants will also support special education students with targeted skills.

Interventions will continue with intense learning at the K-6 students using DIBEL and STAR data. All school schedules have TEAM (Together Everyone Achieves More) time built into the regular school schedule. This is a 40 minute, daily intensive intervention time for ALL students. The students are divided into small groups and are placed into skill groups for targeted instruction for both reading and math. TA's and extra AIS teachers were hired so students could be divided into small groups according to their deficits. This intervention for K-3 will reach students from subgroups that have not had the literature rich environment that supports reading on grade level.

Example of how TEAM time will look for reading

- Entire grade levels were screened with STAR, DIBELS, and CBM ORF (4-6)
- Entire grade level given the phonics screener assessment (Quick Phonics screener QPS)
- Entire grade level will be grouped according to the students' proficiency on the phonics continuum
- Each building will dedicate staff to take groups for re-teaching the phonics skills, classroom teachers, reading teachers, Special ed teachers, teaching
 assistants
- Up to 8 in small groups is optimal
- · Focus is to increase students' phonics and phonemic awareness proficiency, leading to oral reading fluency
- · Groups will be taught via the SIX-STEP lesson plan structure, created by reading teachers and classroom teachers for their groups and TA's.
- Students will progress through the phonics continuum and move through the groups

Added counselors were added to address the attendance issues. The interventions will include one to one check in's and counseling, social stories for students needed reteaching moments, as referred to below in the questions dedicated to interventions.

After school tutoring for all students identified by the data for math and ELA. The groups will be targeted interventions by skills. Assessment data and data collected through weekly at-risk team meetings on struggling students will be used to use interventions, such as consultation to counseling and referrals to our on site mental health specialists, K-12.

The district will be holding summer school for the 2021-2023 school years for K-8. The program will have small groups with intense academic interventions for math and ELA. In addition SEL lessons will incorporated daily. The program will run 6 week, 5 days a week for 3 1/2 hours. The high school will offer courses so students can make up any classes they might not have earned credit for during the school year.

Teacher training is required for summer school for ELA and SEL along with using Iready for diagnostic purposes. In addition to teachers in the program there are: librarians, nurses, teaching assistants, school counselors, adminstrators and typists.

During the school year, after school tutoring will be available at all levels. Teacher will stay after for small group instruction and homework help. Students will be targeted in order to either preteach skills or reteach skills. Busing will be available for all students.

The requirement for increased inspection of data will be supported by added team leaders at the elementary level. The team leaders will allow for the elementary principals to run more frequent data meetings and will help with gathering the data. An administrator for K-12 Literacy will be hired through Title funding and ARP, in order to help orchestrate and facilitate meetings.

Parent instructions for how to use computers for remote learning will be offered this is to prepare if there is a need to quaratine any students.

Additional support in the lunch program (due to 6 feet distancing, more folks are needed to prepare food to be served in classrooms (bagged and hot lunches)) and transportation for students that may be remote and have to have breakfast and lunch delivered.

Continue of Leader in Me licensing for a school as requested from the stakeholders in 1 building.

Technology, will be addressing the continuation of one to one devices so all students are prepared to use google classroom. The district is starting to replace our smart boards due to the aging equipment and replacing with Cleartouch panels. This will allow teachers to use technology in whole group or small group lessons.

In the space provided below, please describe how the LEA will ensure that the interventions it implements, including but not limited to the interventions implemented under section 2001(e)(1) - the required reserve of 20% of funds - to address the academic impact of lost instructional time, will respond to the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students, and particularly those students disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, including students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, and migratory students.

During the school day, additional math specialist will be hired to provide intervention for any student that qualifies for AIS services. Our data from benchmarking (STAR) showed a decline from pre-COVID results. The district till be proactive and provide more small group instruction with students struggling with math concepts in each grade level. The biggest comment we received from all stakeholders was the need for added counseling support. The counseling will target our students disproportionately impacted by COVID-19. This is not a scatter approach, the use of data will help identify student subgroups that were most impacted by COVID and loss of instruction and mental health support.

The district will be hiring additional Teacher Assistants to work in small groups with any student not reaching the expected growth for any grade level reading skills at the K-3 grade level. Our commitment is to have a robust reading program at K-3 so there is a very small amount of students lacking any foundational skills in reading-shown to come from our subgroups (poverty, SWD, ENL, homelessness). Materials to support in classroom learning will be aligned to reading skills, such as more decodable books in classrooms, posters, sound walls, and more training manuals for Heggerty Phonemic Awareness. Our ENL teachers will continue to consult with all teachers for added support with the students they service, by being part of TEAM time and taking their students along with other students to fill in the gaps.

Reading coaches will be hired to work with teachers to help interpret benchmarking and monitoring data, plan intervention instruction and model Tier I instruction. All students will be targeted so it will include our students in all subgroups, including students from low-income, students of color, ENL, SWD's, McKinney Vento, foster care children, and migratory students.

School counselors will be added to all the school buildings since we are bringing back all the students. The goal is increase SEL lessons at all grade levels and allow time for more counseling services.

Lunch time student mentoring will be added at the middle school. This program will allow for adult student daily check ins for the most at-risk students. Targeting students from the subgroups of poverty, students of color, ENL, SWD's, Mckinney Vento, foster care, and migratory students. The team identifies these students and will be making the daily connections with the students.

Training in TCIS (therapeutic crisis intervention for schools), the district will be training teams throughout the year. This will ensure trained teams in the building for all students that might be in crisis.

Teachers will be trained with the Poverty Simulation Program so they have time to feel and be immersed in the day to day problems of our poverty students.

The district has targeted all sub groups through our plan. When our data is disaggregated, the sub groups that have not shown a lot of growth in reading and math will be targeted and placed in appropriate skill groups. Since our district has a high percentage of poverty students, the impact of all academic interventions will

The increase in AIS providers K-12 will help support our SWD and ESL subgroups since there will be more time available for scheduling these subgroups. The scheduling has always been a delicate balance trying to meet the required IEP & ESL minutes and and meeting the Tier 2 required time. Having additional support will allow the providers time to flex schedules at various grade levels in the elementary level. The additional academic support in math and reading will allow for more homogenius skills grouping.

The high school will have a learning lab staffed with all 4 contents experts (math, science, English, social studies) so students can access homework help anytime during the day or after school. The lab will also assist any student that wants to take AP courses, this is to open AP courses up to ALL students regardless of past academic pathways.
